### Dear Potential PTA Applicant,

Thank you for your interest in our Program! Enclosed please find the Curriculum Plan and Information Sheet regarding selection procedures for acceptance into the Physical Therapist Assistant Program. Please check our website, <a href="www.occc.edu/health/pta.html">www.occc.edu/health/pta.html</a> for the latest information and application to our program. We begin with a cohort of 20 students each fall.

There is a selective admissions process using a preference point system because there are more applicants than available spaces in the program. The current application is available on our website beginning in November each year and has a \$20 selective admissions fee that must be paid at the time of application. The deadline for the application to be received via the online format is **the first Friday in March by noon** for a fall entry into the program. If the student has not attended OCCC, there is a \$30.00 OCCC enrollment fee with the first class attended. The PTA classes are held in the late afternoons and evenings but occasional daytime participation is required, primarily during the clinical education practicums. These courses involve a total 18 weeks of clinical experience in selected physical therapy settings and occur **during the day (8-5 or similar) Monday through Friday** in the summer after the first year and the second spring semester of the program. They will require individual transportation off campus.

Additionally, applicants must <u>have COMPLETED</u> BIO 1314 Anatomy and Physiology I or semester-long college-level Human Anatomy course with lab <u>and</u> BIO 1414 Anatomy and Physiology II or semester-long Human Physiology course with lab with a minimum grade of "C" <u>prior to BIO 2102 Clinical Anatomy-January intercession</u>. Although this is not considered a prerequisite <u>to apply</u> to the program, having a background in anatomy and physiology is very important to help each student grasp the concepts presented in the PTA classes.

After acceptance, the OCCC PTA Program is a two-year integrated program, meaning that it takes two years (five semesters including the summer clinical practicum) to complete the PTA coursework and receive the Associate of Applied Science in Physical Therapist Assistant Degree, regardless of any courses that have already been completed, degrees earned, or work experience. I strongly suggest observing in the physical therapy field to insure the student's personal attributes and interests match the job requirements of a physical therapist assistant. The physical therapist assistant degree is NOT a stepping stone toward the doctorate in physical therapy degree. There are three bridge programs PTA-DPT that require a bachelor's degree, GRE test results and 2-3 years of experience as a physical therapist assistant prior to application.

For students to successfully complete the PTA Program and become licensed, they must be able to meet all cognitive and behavioral objectives listed on the individual course syllabi and demonstrate competency of all required skills. Clinical agencies also have requirements in place that all students must meet. Students who do not met the agency requirements will not be able complete the clinical practicums. This means that these student(s) cannot successfully pass the course(s) which require clinical performance and cannot be successful in the program. Please see the attachment regarding essential functions of the PTA for activity requirements.

Currently, the cost of in-state tuition and fees is \$135.29 per credit hour (2024-2025). This is the sixth year in a row that OCCC has not raised tuition costs! Beginning in 2020, 69 credit hours are required for the PTA degree including the general education and support courses. Estimated costs associated with the PTA Program are available on the website. All students must purchase medical malpractice liability insurance, which is available through the bursar's office (estimated cost, \$30.00 annually). This must be purchased annually prior to the first PTA class each fall. Verification of immunizations including: two negative tuberculosis

(TB or PPD) tests, two MMR vaccinations, two chicken pox (varicella) vaccinations, TDaP, influenza, and a series of three hepatitis B vaccinations or a signed declination letter will be required. It is required for the students who are accepted to bring those copies to the new PTA student orientation to complete their files. OCCC does not require the COVID-19 vaccination for admittance or continuance in the PTA program. Clinical partners/sites may, however require the vaccine for clinical practicums. Students must complete clinical practicums to earn AAS degree and be eligible for PTA licensure. The other requirement is a current Healthcare Provider level CPR documentation, The CPR and the TB must remain current throughout the PTA Program to comply with clinical requirements. OCCC will offer CPR classes in the summer and early fall to those in need.

Due to clinical agency requirements, all students must obtain an extensive, nationwide Background Report which includes, but is not limited to, Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) searches for sex offender, violent offender, and criminal history. The background report must occur within 3 months prior to the first day of class. The procedure and fee (\$42.50) are explained in more detail when acceptance materials are mailed. Clinical agency representative(s) review the reports that have a criminal history. The facility alone can accept or deny clinical access to a student. If a student is denied access to the clinical sites he/she will be unable to successfully complete the program.

Drug testing is required for all students in the Division of Health Professions. Each student will provide a sample for a 11 panel, pre-placement drug test prior to the first clinical assignment. Students must produce a **negative drug** result to remain eligible for the program. If a student is prescribed normal daily medications, from a medical professional, a Medical Review Officer will be able to determine eligibility. Any student receiving a confirmed positive drug test from the MRO will not be eligible to continue in the program, but may reapply to any of the Health Professions Programs for a future semester. Admission is based on program application procedures and is not guaranteed. Failure of a second drug test will result in dismissal from all of the HP Programs with no opportunity for readmission. Any break in continuous enrollment will result in an additional pre-placement drug test, at the cost of the student. Licensing agencies require that any criminal history or positive drug test results must be reported to the appropriate licensing agency. **Please note – while medical marijuana is legal in the State of Oklahoma, it is not accepted in healthcare or in any of the Health Professions Programs at OCCC. A positive test for marijuana will result in the student's loss of eligibility to remain in a HP Program.** 

In the past two years (2022, 2023 graduates), 76.5% of students who were admitted to the PTA Program graduated with an Associate of Applied Science degree and 100% of the PTA graduates have successfully passed the national board exam becoming licensed physical therapist assistants. Our program graduates enjoy 100% job placement with starting salaries in the \$54,000-\$66,754 range depending on practice setting. We are fully accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Physical Therapy Education and were the first accredited PTA program in Oklahoma. The clinical community strongly supports this program as evidenced by the participation in our clinical education program, Program Advisory Committee, and graduate job placement.

#### **ADMISSIONS AND GENERAL INFORMATION**

- Applications for admissions to the Physical Therapist Assistant Program may be obtained online at www.occc.edu/health/pta. Application periods are once per year with deadlines occurring in early spring.
- Applicants must first qualify for admission to Oklahoma City Community College according to the criteria for admission by submitting official transcripts from every college/university attended (including concurrent coursework).
- Fees include a \$30.00 first time enrollment fee (for students new to OCCC) and a \$20.00 selective application fee as stated in the current College Catalog. The selective application fee receipt must be uploaded with the PTA application.
- It is very important that individuals interested in applying to the PTA Program begin by meeting with an advisor to ensure admissions criteria has been met (testing and GPA requirement).
- There are basic application requirements (reading, writing, math tests, and GPA) which must be met to qualify for application consideration. Once these basic application requirements are met, the applicant is placed on a candidate list in order of the total number of preference points earned. Although preference points are optional, they are the means for selection of each class admitted to the PTA Program. In the event of duplicate preference points, cumulative GPA is used to rank the candidates, with Science GPA used as the next criteria used for duplicate preference points, if needed.
- Only completed PTA applications will be accepted. They must include all documents: fee
  receipt, test scores, and work experience forms. Preference points will be assigned
  accordingly.
- An official transcript from each of the colleges/universities attended must be submitted to
  the office of records to be reviewed at the time of application. (including concurrent work).
   Students can view the transcripts from their student portal to ensure the most recent
  transcripts have been received (especially necessary for course and degree verification).
- Applications will be considered for the specified application period only.
   Applicants not selected may reapply for admission during the next application cycle. There is no limit to the number of times the applicant may apply to enter the PTA Program as a first-time PTA student. If a student is terminated from the OCCC PTA Program due to failure of a PTA course or withdrawal due to a failing grade and unable to complete the OCCC PTA Program in the three-year timeframe, that student will be ineligible to reapply to the OCCC PTA Program.
- A cohort of twenty students is selected to begin the PTA Program each fall.
- For students to successfully complete any of the programs in Health Professions, they must be able to meet all the cognitive and behavioral objectives listed in the course syllabi and demonstrate competency of all required skills. PTA essential functions can be found in the PTA Student Handbook and on the PTA website under prospective student letter. Students with disabling conditions, who require accommodation to meet objectives or demonstrate required skills, must contact OCCC Student Accessibility and Support at (405) 682-7520 each semester enrolled to ensure accommodations.
- Clinical Agencies have requirements in place that all students must meet. Students who do
  not meet agency requirements (background checks, immunization requirements, drug testing)
  will not be able to attend that clinical. That means that those students cannot successfully
  pass the course(s) that require clinical performance and cannot be successful in the PTA
  program.
- Please note while medical marijuana is legal in the State of Oklahoma, it is not accepted in healthcare or in any of the Health Professions Programs at OCCC. A positive test for

marijuana will result in the student's loss of eligibility to remain in a Health Professions Program.

#### ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS OF THE PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANT

I understand the physical and cognitive requirements of this program to be strenuous. I must be able to meet the following *Essential functions*:

- 1. Read, write and spell at the collegiate level
- 2. Demonstrate common sense, problem solving abilities, and sound judgment
- 3. Communicate effectively verbally and in writing
- 4. Typing/keyboarding skills for efficient documentation
- 5. Stand for 8 hours
- 6. Sit for 8 hours
- 7. Perform skills requiring manual dexterity, fine motor skills
- 8. Maintain good standing balance on all surfaces
- 9. Administer manual exercises
- 10. Perform skills requiring constant walking
- 11. Make simple mechanical adjustments and repairs of therapy equipment
- 12. Safely transfer patients from all surfaces
- 13. Measure vital signs
- 14. Lift up to 50# frequently
- 15. Lift up to 150# occasionally
- 16. Squat, stoop, kneel and/or crawl
- 17. Transport patients with wheelchairs and carts by pushing and pulling
- 18. Achieve "Health Care Provider" level CPR
- 19. Educate patients and other consumers of physical therapy
- 20. Responds/performs appropriately in the event of unexpected and/or stressful situations
